


















MUSIC & WORSHIP

We would encourage anyone who has ideas on deepening the spiritual experience of our worship and music, is able to attend three fourths of our meetings and available to assist with our weekly and special services please contact Wendy Jewell. The roster for voting purposes will close July 1st for the 2024-2025 calendar year. Everyone is always welcome to attend any meeting throughout the year to offer input.

Christianity and hospitality go hand in hand, so each person who enters God's house needs to feel welcomed and cared for. This initial responsibility falls to our ushers as the face of the church. Therefore, being ready to serve others by being welcoming, covering any need that may arise and remaining alert to respond in case of an emergency are our duties. Ushering teams are three fourths in place for the remainder of 2024, but we still need help on the fourth and fifth Sundays of the month and we are always in need of alternates. It is a great way to meet new people!

Safety- To improve our readiness, we have purchased new first aid kits, one for each building and a second AED to be hung near the restroom in the Sanctuary building. The education building has an AED in the lower hall way, where new pads have been purchased. If anyone is interested in learning how to administer CPR or how to use the defibrillator, please notify Wendy Jewell and we will arrange another class.

Parents with Infants- In order to meet the needs of our growing number of parents with young children, we have placed a rocking chair in the narthex so a child may be comforted without the parent having to miss the service. We now also have a foldable changing table available in the sanctuary building in the old session room to your left.

Incorporation of Presbyterian Creeds-In The Constitution of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) Book of Confessions,

the church declares to its members and to the world what it is, what it believes and what it resolves to do. Each creed comes from a particular time, place and circumstance in history and are intended to guide the church in its study of the scriptures thereby directing the church in maintaining sound doctrines. We have included The Theological Declaration of Barmen, The Confession of 1967, A Brief Statement of Faith, the Belhar Confession in addition to the Apostle's Creed thus far in our services. Each has a clarification to our beliefs in direct response to the injustice of the time. The Presbyterian Theoacademy offers additional tutorials on the various creeds and catechisms that can be viewed on YouTube or offered if there is an interest.

Outdoor Services- Two outdoor services were held this past year during cooler weather in the spring and fall. We look forward to doing so again once the lawn in Wragg Park has had a chance to take root and settle.

Community Services- Thanksgiving and Maundy Thursday continue to bring area churches together in our sanctuary. It is a reminder that we are not alone in this world. We have many sisters and brothers of all walks of life open to sharing their talents as we worship the same God.

Special Services- World Wide Communion Sunday we incorporated various types of breads from around the world and All Saints Day we added the ringing of the bell and a moment of silence in memory of those we lost in this past year.

Music- Gospel Sundays continued to be enjoyed and a few new artists have joined the ranks. Our musical staff have included updated melodies to some of our old favorites. The music program at Second has been busy since last year. The choir sang in services nearly every week and we have had a Gospel music Sunday every month. We were fortunate to hire Melody Butcher, of CSU, in November 2023, to serve as choir soprano section leader, and also to direct our children's choir. She has served admirably in both of these capacities, and has also recently joined the Bell Choir. Her boyfriend Nate Grav has also contributed significantly to worship services here, as a tenor in the choir, but also in the Bell Choir (where he's had a lot of prior experience) and also playing trumpet. They have both recently joined the church, and we are grateful to both of them.

We hosted joint services with other churches for Community Thanksgiving in November, and Maundy Thursday in March. The Gospel service on the fourth Sunday of the month has featured singers Grace Ramsey, Michelle Lincoln, Dakare Chatman and Lacy Miller, Jasmine Crowder and the Charleston Gospel Choir (three times, in June and December, 2023 and April 2024) as well as keyboardists Anna Brock and Victor McKelvey. The Gospel service music was incorporated into the budget this year so that musicians can be paid.

We also hosted C of C Student recitals, Piccolo Spoleto concerts, as well as Charleston Symphony Orchestra youth concerts and Dr. Young Woon Cho, pianist from Boston . We've had guest musicians as well: clarinet; trumpets, flute, Charleston Southern University flute choir; violin, student organists. Tripp Carrington sang solos for worship and did wonderful duets with brother Beckett in the Christmas Eve service.

Handbell Choir played monthly in the service and at special services in the year. We continue to improve skills and add joyful sound to worship. We welcome new members as well.

As Charleston Academy of Music is in residence here, we have many young musicians and their families coming and going weekly for lessons, classes and studio recitals. Second Presbyterian Church is becoming known as a music hub in Charleston. Musicians who play in our sanctuary consistently comment on the fine acoustics.

In December, the kids were preparing for the Christmas Pageant in which they sang songs such as Silent Night, The First Noel, Joy to the World, O Little Town of Bethlehem, and Hark the Herald Angels Sing. After Christmas, we began learning about some music theory, including solfège and rhythms. In January, they sang This Is the Day, with piano accompaniment. During the Easter service, the kids were featured in On This Holy Easter Morn, with the adult choir.

From Lee Lingle (choir director):

The choir at Second Presbyterian continues to faithfully support the church's mission thru music. We have worked hard on larger musical endeavors for special services such as Christmas Eve, Easter, and Holy Week. Two of the largest musical offerings in the church year are the Good Friday Tenebrae service and the Christmas Eve service. Last year I encouraged the congregation to consider attending these highly spiritually moving services and I am pleased that the challenge was accepted and fulfilled.

The choir works very hard on these two services specifically and they continue to be the musical and spiritual highlight of the year for me. However, we also joyfully spread the good news of Christ's message weekly during worship.

The choir has made tremendous improvements in their ability to learn new music and present it at a high level considering only having one rehearsal a week. The choir achieves this by working to polish and shape musical themes, while also welcoming newcomers to the ranks and supporting them in their musical growth as well.

We are always looking to add more members to our choir family. I say this several times a year and the call has been answered by some. Brother King has recently joined us as well as Karen Lee. They both have been amazing additions to the choir family, but we have room for more! It is such a special opportunity to come together to create something greater than we can on our own to glorify God. We have a lot of fun while working hard at this and welcome anyone of any ability to join us.

CHILDREN & YOUTH CHRISTIAN EDUCATION







The "norms" that we looked for after the pandemic are slowly returning. This does not mean we will ever return to what things were like before everything changed. Our nursery continues to operate from the hours of 9:45 Sunday mornings until 11:45. We have welcomed parent volunteers in the nursery this year and we've had so many willing helpers for which we are grateful. We did hire a new nursery worker for Sunday school to replace the student worker we had. We now have one "adult" worker. This worker has afforded us consistency that we had not had for several years. Children's Chapel has continued to grow this year, After Children's Time in church kids are once again, invited to Chapel for a time of fun and faith formation to learn songs, Bible basics, and how worship is a continuous response to God's grace. We then leave chapel and head to the classroom for a time of coloring and discussion and hopefully, fun. We have also continued with Children & Youth Sundays every Sunday from 4-6pm. We have searched for a mission and, as of now, we have begun feeding the unhoused the 4th Sunday of every month. Other Sundays are filled with games, activities and hopefully the broadening of our Christian beliefs. The children have helped to bring awareness and raise funds for Thornwell, Souper bowl Sunday and Tywanza Sanders Legacy Foundation. We also pushed for Walk for Water and held bake sales which raised over \$500 which will go toward CE initiatives like VBS and fixing up the youth room. Speaking of the youth room, it has been fixed up to include a basketball shooting game, ping-pong, air hockey, and foosball. We have been able to get back to in-person events too this year, including a monthly Kid's Night at the church. In October we again hosted a Trunk-or-Treat which we held in conjunction with SPK. The parking lot was full, the candy overflowed and SPK families and so many congregants decorated cars and dressed up for the event. We look forward to more partnerships with SPK during the upcoming year. Our children's Christmas pageant was held in service in December with a more complete presentation. It was, again, designed to work with limited practice. We were able to find a time for rehearsal and fun. We continued a family-friendly Christmas Eve service Christmas Eve afternoon. The original production of this Lenten devotional was comprised of contributions from the Rev. Dr. Thomas K. Tewell, former Senior Pastor of Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church in New York City. Each day's devotional was provided via email in weekly sets, and daily on the church website and Facebook page.

I love getting to work with small group leaders to develop curriculum and build community around the good news of the gospel. I am grateful for each of you who have been a part of the conversations and belonging offered through these community spaces.

Presbyterian Women's Circle Bible Study

From September to May, women met monthly at Robbie Staubes' home to consider and discuss Jesus and Jesus' disciples who shared the Good News through sacred encounters with everyday people following the PW/Horizons Bible Study Sacred Encounters: The Power and Presence of Jesus Christ in Luke-Acts by Olive Mahabir. Over We considered the message to the early Christian community (and to us) as radical, inclusive, and hope-filled. These monthly meetings provided an opportunity to grow in faith and fellowship.

Inclusive Community Group

The monthly Tuesday small group, our LGBTQ+ focused gathering, has enjoyed fellowship and fantastic conversation during its third year meeting. We were happy to have Joshua Hall move back to the area and he has helped Sarah Harbin lead the discussions. This group discusses theology and Christian life as LGBTQ+ and ally people, focusing this year on topics of meaning to the group. About 10 people from our group volunteered at We Are Family's Giving Tuesday phone drive in December. We had a group of ~30 walk with the church in the 2023 Charleston Pride and we're looking forward to the next Pride parade on June 1, 2024.

Thursday Night Bible Study

In the third year of this small group, we met weekly and discussed a variety of subjects and studied Life Together by Dietrich Bonhoeffer in the spring and engaged the church-wide Lenten devotionals at the beginning of each meeting during Lent. We met many weeks at different members' homes and some weeks at public spaces, including restaurants for dinner. We lost Amy King who helped to lead the group the two previous years as she moved to Savannah in the fall to teach at SCAD. Our group has shifted and grown this year; we generally have 6-8 people mixed from a group of closer to a dozen, with 25 people in our online community. We discussed a range of topics again this year and this group continues to be a space of belonging for a community of believers to wrestle together with faith and make sense of what is happening in the world. We grappled with scripture and how it applies to our experience in the world today and enjoy the opportunity to celebrate and grieve together and welcome others into belonging.

Second Edition Book Club

The book club meets on the 2nd Sunday of each month to discuss a variety of books. The average attendance is approximately 12, comprised of members of the church and other guests. This is a social gathering and there is no official membership. Books are selected 6 times a year. - Respectfully submitted by Carol Howe

MISSIONS

- As in the Easter season of every year, we at Second Presbyterian joined others of the PC(USA) in the One Great Hour of Sharing. This gift feeds the hungry around the world, aids in repairs in disaster areas, and helps those in crisis in self-development projects.
- On Mother's Day, we remembered those living in the Presbyterian Communities of South Carolina who have outlived their retirement savings. With other churches around the state, we gave to allow them to remain in their residences.

I was homeless and you gave me a room,

- At the end of May, we were thrilled to have the Seconds Please Tea Room back in business. This is a way we raise funds for specific local and global mission projects. We were able to send checks to Star Gospel Mission, where homeless men get a place to stay, good meals, and a fresh start in this Christ-centered place, to Sea Island Hunger Awareness Foundation, which supports several meals and grocery programs, and to the Shaw Center down the street, serving neighborhood children and youth. Our church has, for most of Medical Benevolence Foundation's sixty years, supported this medical missions organization, started by medical missionaries who realized the necessity of training local medical personnel.
- The Pentecost offering, usually in June, is the second of our four denomination-wide special offerings. The
 emphasis is support for work with children and youth. A portion of the offering can be retained for use by the
 congregation.

- As summer progressed, we began preparing for the Hands of Christ event, when we give out school clothing and supplies to children in kindergarten through grade 8. The congregation gave an abundance of supplies or money to buy more of what was needed, and the clothing was supplied by the purchasing team at Westminster Presbyterian, central to all the distribution churches. On distribution day the second week-end in August, each child was greeted by her/his "personal shopper", and they made the rounds of the different stations to pick out their clothing and supplies. We were able to serve 179 children of 73 families. This is a meaningful way to volunteer for the Kingdom of God. This year we'll do it again, so look for the sign-up poster!
- We started hosting Fourth Sunday Barbecue in conjunction with the Navigation Center in August of last year.
 The Navigation Center works to empower the most vulnerable to navigate from crisis to sustainable, independent living. Centralized services and resources, tailored plans, and intensive case management are staples in their model to help vulnerable populations navigate from crisis to sustainable, independent living. The 4th Sunday Barbecue dinners are held the fourth Sunday of each month in the fellowship hall, which is part of building relationships and trust with those in need.
- The First Sunday Food Drive happens each month. Bring donations for our "First Sunday Food Drive" this Sunday! Members of the congregation donates non-perishable food and toiletry donations for our neighbors at The Canterbury House, who live on a fixed income in the non-profit senior living community downtown. Also, desserts are collected in the church kitchen to be included with lunches for Meals on Mondays, an outreach program that delivers meals to folks on Wadmalaw.
- Third Sunday Breakfasts are served at the Star Gospel Mission on the third Sunday of each month. The Mission works to transform lives through Jesus Christ by compassionately providing resources for people experiencing hardships. Please contact Sally McDuffie or the church office to volunteer.
- On the first Sunday of October, we gave to the third church-wide special offering, Peace and Global Witness.
 Twenty-five percent of the offering stayed with local congregations, twenty-five percent went to mid councils to unite congregations to promote peacemaking in their regions, and half of it went towards work for peace and reconciliation being done by Presbyterians being done across the globe.
- November is Remember Thornwell Month. Thornwell has expanded its work as a home for orphans to being a center for building strong families. We gave our offerings of support on the Sunday before Thanksgiving.
- In December, the fourth church-wide special offering, Christmas Joy, was given the Sunday before Christmas.
 This goes to retired pastors and other church workers who find themselves in need of extra support for an
 emergency or other life change. It also goes to students in Presbyterian-related racial-ethnic schools who are
 preparing for serving in the church.
- Also in December, Fourth Sunday Barbecue held a Christmas Eve dinner for vulnerable and unhoused families
 served by the Navigation Center at St. John's Chapel. The dinner included a short children's service and gift
 bags for men, women, and children. In addition to necessities, there were fun items included in the bags for kids.
 There was wide support for this event from the congregation, local businesses, and local restaurants (we didn't
 have to cook this time!). The needy children loved having somewhere to go on Christmas Eve.
- $\bullet \ \ In \ February, we hosted the Souper Bowl Chili Cookoff, raising almost \$1,000 to support our 4th Sunday BBQs.$
- In March, we came full circle as we "Walked for Water" to support Water Mission. Twelve members signed up to join Team Captain Jessica Brock in the Second to None team. They raised over \$400 to support this local organization which does so much around the world to help people have safe drinking water!
- Also in March, Fourth Sunday Barbecue hosted the Navigation Center's Easter Celebration & Carnival at the church for families served by the Navigation Center. It included lunch, an egg hunt, a children's message delivered by Ken Carrington, crafts, and kids' activities and was a big hit with the children.

Second Presbyterian Preschool and Kindergarten has nearly completed our 47th year of offering young children in the Charleston Area a safe, happy environment for learning. We welcome children ages 18 months through five to participate in the program. Our teachers provide positive discipline and teaching skills and they take pride in making the classrooms inviting and in the careful planning of developmentally sound learning activities.

We have a very active Parents' Guild to help with events and fundraising. Our main fundraising events are the annual Christmas Wreath Sale and the Spring Auction.



- The Guild helps maintain the back entrance to the grounds and the play areas which includes twice yearly
 mulch installation. This group pays for our mosquito/gnat control treatments monthly. This year they paid for
 the repairs and painting of our windows. We are very grateful for the fundraising efforts and contributions
 that our school family provides to help make the campus safe and attractive.
- The Guild paid for additional security cameras so that Erin and Sue have the ability to watch the entire perimeter of the school at all times from the office.
- The Parents' Guild helps teachers feel appreciated by sponsoring Teacher Appreciation Week and also
 providing lunch for teachers on workdays. They also stock our refrigerator with healthy snacks and drinks.
 They honor teachers at Christmas with gift cards and gifts. The Guild provides special gifts and meals for our
 staff throughout the school year.
- Our parents provide for classroom improvements and fill teachers' wish list requests for learning materials and educational toys.

The Weekday Program serves 65 children. The school is a Christ-centered program and the Christian atmosphere is most visible on Wednesday mornings when we gather to worship in the Chapel. Parents sometimes join us at this joyful time to praise God through the Word, music, prayers and stories. Ken Carrington, provides a special child friendly teaching from the Bible and we sing, pray and praise! Pastor Cress is on hand also

and gives our children the closing blessing. The church staff and the staff of the weekday program work closely together spread the gospel to young children. The school organized Kindergarten Sunday with special music lead by our music teacher, Ms. Sarah Morrison. Over 200 church members and kindergarten families were present for this celebration.Our Deacons provided assistance and wonderful food for the reception. What a joyful day!

FINANCE

The 2nd Presbyterian Church finance committee wishes to report on the status of the church's finances. For the 2024 calendar year the church received pledges totaling \$262,812. We had hoped to have \$300,000 in pledges and will emphasize giving when pledge season comes around this year.

We have budgeted \$510,900 in total income for 2024 against budgeted expenses \$526,182 for a shortfall of \$15,282. This projected shortfall does not include pay raises for the staff which will go into effect in the next month.

The good news is for the first time in several years the church balanced the budget in 2023. This occurred because of gifts to the church, income from leasing the parking lot and income from weddings which we host as well as savings from renegotiating the church's insurance policies.

We have concentrated on performing maintenance on the church itself and on the education building. There is currently maintenance needed on the graveyard side of the church around the gutter and the need for paint and caulking on the entire side. There is similar maintenance required for the rear of the church building and the graveyard side of the education building. We are in the process of getting an estimate for these costs as well as determining how the maintenance will be funded.

. PARK RENOVATION:

A long-awaited renovation of Wragg Square in front of our Sanctuary began in January 2024 after workdays were organized in memory of Patti McGee in early 2023. The Wragg Square Renovation Committee was formed (comprised of members of the McGee family, city officials, members of Garden District Neighborhood Association, the Charleston Parks Conservancy and Rev. Darwin) and met on a regular basis seeking input and approval from all parties involved to design a lasting memorial to the legacy of Patti and Peter McGee in Wragg Square.

After much work, study, and consultation with arborists and park designers, four diseased water oaks were removed to create an open and inviting green space for all Charleston residents and visitors to enjoy. New live oak and palmetto trees were added among the existing live oaks, along with stone pathways, flowering plants, sod, irrigation, seating, brick repointing, and LED lighting to liven the space.

A celebration was held on Sunday afternoon, April 7 that was a well-attended reception and dedication. We were happy to host the event which brought together city dignitaries, church members, and many family and friends of Patti McGee, whose legacy inspired the garden renovation and plant selections. We are all grateful for this beautiful addition to our landscape over Meeting Street. The McGee and Colbert families made this effort possible in honor of longtime Second Presbyterian Church members. Peter and Patti McGee.

GRAVEYARD WALL

The bulging wall on Charlotte Street that surrounds the church graveyard collapsed in November 2022 after having been cordoned off; the bricks were preserved to be reused. Since City Council had earlier approved the settlement between the City and our business neighbor The Dewberry Hotel and its owner John Dewberry to restore the compromised wall, assessments were able to being without delay to move the project forward. The City, The Dewberry, and Second Presbyterian Church have been able to work together toward the rebuilding of the wall, with restoration of the wall beginning in Fall 2023. The project is expected to be completed by the end of June 2024.

SANCTUARY & FRONT UPDATES

The 2023 Tag Sale funds have gone toward beautification efforts around the sanctuary building and the committee is grateful for the team who made the Tag Sale such a success to fund the care of the church. In September, the Sanctuary doors were refinished by hardworking craftsmen, Omar Lima and his father. New signs along the church fence replaced wooden boards that were beginning to rot. A stand-alone sign has also been added out front of the sanctuary to welcome people into church life here at Second Church.

EDUCATION BUILDING

New interior shutters in the conference room and the Chapel were generously donated by two Second Presbyterian families and the refrigerator was replaced in the church kitchen.
