We're responsible and we need to be involved:

- Marion Mitchell is leading a study, 'Higher Ground' that discusses CO2 reduction, spirituality and Environmental Stewardship
- Trish Milner & Geneva Canty are spearheading our participation in the building of two more Habitat houses
- We take seriously not just who/whose we are but where we are, adjacent to the east side. We
 work with Redeemer PCA and the Shaw Center for tutoring, coaching, discipleship, VBS
- We seek to reduce the costs of maintenance and increase the chances for face time by structured "Beautify the Yard Days." (Next one coming October 27th)
- Wednesday Night/Church Night offers simple meals, two women's and one men's Bible/Book studies as the children study and grow in faith and in familiarity

Folks, these activities are just a snapshot of what you'll read about as you explore this newsletter. Take your time. Savor what it looks like and reads like to be a member of a body that is vibrant, diverse, growing and becoming known as a place that welcomes everyone to encounter and follow Jesus.

You'll be made aware of our need as well. Dying churches don't need volunteers or money. Please participate in the joy of Second life and fund Christ's top-tier plans of reclamation through God's church here.

COMMUNITY We value the image of God in all people, everywhere. We believe that we were created to live deeply with one another, carrying each other's burdens, sharing our resources, praying for and confessing our sins to each other, suffering

and celebrating together. It is in these honest, loving relationships that God transforms us, and truth of Christ's promises becomes a reality. The way of Jesus cannot be lived alone.

SERVING We believe that Jesus is God in human form, and that the church is God's ongoing presence in the world. Led by the Spirit of God, we are passionate about relieving suffering and fighting injustice by joining the God of the oppressed in living out the transforming message of the resurrected Jesus. Jesus calls his church to be a compelling force for good in the world, and we believe that the church is at its best when it serves, sacrifices and loves, caring about the things God cares about. We were created to live for something larger than ourselves.

CELEBRATING We take great joy in partnering with God to change the world, embracing the truth that all of life is sacred, hope is real and that tomorrow can be better than today. We celebrate the divine in the daily, pursue lives of hope, reflect gratitude, and renew ourselves in worship. God invites everyone everywhere into this way of life, and we believe it is the best possible way to live.





For the most part, these amounts fill in shortages in the donations given earlier in the year.

Vacation Bible School was a great success, involving children from the nearby neighborhood as well as from our congregation and that of Redeemer Presbyterian. It was partly supported by the *Pentecost* special offering and with a number of mission team members working as helpers. Many other members of the congregation donated supplies.



At Hands of Christ, Second Church served 208 children on Monday and 164 on Tuesday, for a total of 372 children one more than last year! Only Aimwell in Walterboro and Second have met last year's



Presbytery youth group for Monday left us severely hampered that day; however, no children were turned away and all visitors were served by exhausted volunteers. We had a great turnout of volunteers on Tuesday including more members from Second, their friends and families.





Finances were a challenge this year for the first time in the 16-year history of Hands of Christ. We entered the distribution planning period \$30,000 short of our funding needs; but thanks to generous churches (including Second), individuals and corporations, we made up the shortfall. - David Savard

Our missionary co-worker, Leisa Wagstaff, was in the U.S. for the summer on interpretation assignment and is now returning to South Sudan. To watch a video

The *Peace & Global Witness* special offering was collected on October 7th, World Communion Sunday. A gift to this offering enables the entire church to collaborate in our proclamation of Christ's peace. Congregations keep 25% to engage in peacemaking and build ministries of reconciliation in their own context or around the world. Some examples of how funds have been used:

- Send participants on mission trips, overseas work projects, and global conferences
- Donate to programs working toward the elimination of human trafficking
- Support the work of a mission co-worker
- Organize a program that teaches children how to resolve conflict and handle angry and sad feelings

The theme of this Season of Peace is "Now may the Lord of peace... give you peace at all times in all ways."

At Thanksgiving we will have the opportunity to support our ministry **Thornwell**, the only ministry of its kind in the synod of South Atlantic serving children and families. The mission of Thornwell involves a complete continuum of care throughout South Carolina, Georgia, and Florida. They focus to provide:

- · Homes that are safe and loving through family-style residential care cottages and foster care families
- Hope for a brighter future through academic and community based programs
- Healing through the nurturing love of Jesus and professional counseling and therapy

During the Christmas season we will collect the *Christmas Joy* special offering. Our gifts will support leaders in our Church - past, present and future.

Prayerfully consider giving and giving more during our special offerings throughout the year to fund the sharing of God's love both locally and globally.


